#### June Meeting Minutes Joe Bannon

Old Business:

We are on for the 17 July visit to the 24" scope at Peoria. Thoughts were offered on how to assemble and caravan to the site. It is about a 1hr + 45 min trip to Peoria with sunset being at ~ 2100 or 9:00 pm. The scope is in Jubilee State Park and it was agreed that the assemblage would leave at 1930/7:30pm. Dana wanted mail sent to him for confirmation of those who planned to attend.

There will be no meeting between now and 17 July and it was agreed that those who were going would meet at our regular meeting site. Saturday, 18 July, is the rain date.

Dana raised the issue that there be no photo sessions with the 20" scope during public star parties – it is there for viewing. Cecil recommended that a sign be placed in a prominent spot first and then if there was a need for a policy then it should be taken to the board for a decision. 27 June is the next public star party and Dana will send a message to the group and the board for discussion.

Treasurer's Report – Steve VanHyfte:

Steve reported on the utility bill and the post office bill. Post Office reduced its rate to \$54.00/year. The utility bill was \$16.75 which seemed high to Steve. The society has used 680kw for its history. We need some insect and weed spray for the observatory site but the bottom line is the club is solvent with a balance of \$1,334.03. We all agreed Steve should be Treasurer for life – Steve has no vote.

Steve then mentioned a missing part and wants everyone to look for it as they may have picked it up inadvertently. No blame assigned – just concern that the part is needed, is expensive and the society needs it to be returned.

As to the star party – Dana asked who wanted to go. He asked that people send him email or call and a group will be rounded up to head out for a night of star viewing.

Dale Hendricks mentioned his trip to Greenwich, England, and the details of its importance to navigation and the determination of longitude. This required precision timepieces that could be carried on ships to measure the time difference of star and planet observations from Greenwich, 0°longitude. Greenwich is a chronometer and astronomer's heaven.

Joyce mentioned that 21 June would show a close gathering of Mars and Venus at 4:00am – weather permitting, it should be a great show. It was also mentioned that on or about the same date, Titan would be casting its shadow on Saturn.

Dana then showed a collection of Hubblecast videos hosted by Dr J. These are interesting and informative – good show, Dana.

Karl Adlon then showed some examples of how a stacker improves the quality of photos – Deep Sky Stacker was also discussed.

No July or August meeting for the group. We will pick up with a September meeting.

### Observations Karl Adlon

Karl bought another telescope! But this time it's for someone else – a niece who's been interested for a while. It's a used telescope from an AstroMart seller; a 5" f5 Celestron Newtonian – probably made in China.

The scope was in very good condition, but a quick look told me it needed collimation. Later, I saw it was way out and when I tried to adjust it - I couldn't. What's an engineer to do? Why, take it apart, of course! I took the 3 screws holding the mirror mount out and had some difficulty removing it. Then I saw the diagonal was positioned too far forward. I adjusted it back toward the bottom of the scope; taped a cross on the bottom of the tube and aimed the secondary.

Then I replaced the main mirror mounting. Or tried to. It wouldn't mount without springing the cell. That's why I had trouble removing it! Three screws protruded far enough into the tube that they contacted the cell. This scope had never worked properly!! It could never have been collimated in this condition. I found six small washers in my spare parts bin; put two under each screw head and reassembled without any issues.

Since I was able to fix it, the scope turns out to be a really good deal. It doesn't look like the scope has ever been apart, so I'm thinking previous owners thought otherwise about it. I wonder how many scope there with similar problems.

Cocoon Nebula - 11 shots, ISO-25600, ranging from 27-31 seconds each (June 28). You can see around the edges the amount of noise generated from shooting at ISO-25600. The central part of the image shows the stacked image which is much better quality.
